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Ofsted facts and figures (Jan 2014)

1 in 7 internet users aged 5-7 (14%) & 1 in 4 aged 8-11 (24%) said they used the internet **mostly alone**.

All age groups are more likely in 2012 to go online using a **tablet computer** (than using a PC/netbook), and children aged 5-7 and 12-15 are more likely to go online **using a mobile phone**.

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Ofsted facts and figures (Jan 2014)

Around 4% of those aged 8-11 [and 9% of those aged 12-15] who use the internet say they have had experience of being bullied online in the past year.

71% of young people would **not** want a college, university or potential employer to conduct an Internet search on them unless they could first remove content from social networking sites.

6 in 10 had never considered that what they put online now, might be permanent, and could be accessed years into the future.



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Internet safety guidelines given to children: STAY SAFE ON LINE



ZIP IT

Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online.



BLOCK IT

Block people who send nasty messages and don't open unknown links and attachments.



FLAG IT

Flag up with someone you trust if anything upsets you or if someone asks to meet you offline.



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Specifics covered in lessons will include:

- Using internet (including class blogging/chat, messaging) responsibly, safely & securely
- Keeping personal details private
- Respecting individuals
- Respecting intellectual property
- Being discerning re digital content
- How to deal with e-safety issues as they arise

Top Tips for Parents

- Be aware
- Get involved
- Learn how to use the safety tools on the service
- Remind your child not to reply to bullying messages
- Keep the evidence
- Report cyberbullying



Protecting Your Child

Listen with sympathy

Talk to your children suggesting that:

- Seeking help is the right thing to do
- They should respect friends online
- They should think before they post

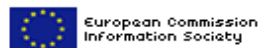
