# Getting ready for starting school

A guide for how you can help your child to prepare for their new school

#### **Beginning school**

Starting school is an exciting time for children and parents but it can also be a worrying time too.

Schools from the STEP Teaching School Alliance have been working with local preschool providers to produce this handy guide. We hope that it will give you some helpful ideas on how you can help your child to prepare for starting their new school.



Our aim is to work alongside you to make sure that your child has a happy and positive experience when they start school.

It is not important if your child cannot read, write or do sums before they start school. Children start school with a wide range of abilities and their teacher will be skilled at helping them to progress at their own level.





## Activities that will help your child to prepare for school

Most teachers agree that, for a child starting school, being able to talk and listen are more important than any academic skills.

You can encourage this by:

- Reading together and discussing books and stories
- Asking your child questions about everyday things
- Encouraging them to play with friends
- Singing nursery rhymes together





#### Independence

Ensuring that your child is as independent as possible dressing and will really help them to settle in at school. Activities that help support independence include:

going to the toilet

on their own

undressing by

knowing what their

belongings look like

themselves

- washing their hands
- feeding themselves
- tidying up their own toys
- walking independently as much as possible.

#### Next steps...

It is important for your preschool provider to know which school your child will be attending. This will enable key workers and staff to support your child by talking about that school in particular.

Schools will have some standard forms that you will need to complete. If you have any concerns about filling these in, please do ask your preschool or nursery provider to help you.





Talking with your new school and sharing the knowledge that you have about your child is invaluable. This information will make it easier for the school to help your child to settle in.

Like you, we all want the best for your child. Pre-schools and schools have excellent relationships and communicate regularly to ensure your child's needs are met as they start their school journey.
