# Charlie Slack - Mile a day

Charlie Slack, from Leicestershire has not missed one day despite setbacks as he embarks on his 300 mile on 3rd December with his school friends by his side

Come wind, rain or lockdown tiers Charlie Slack has been determined to get outside and run a mile every day since the first lockdown as he was compelled to take action during the most uncertain time of everyone's lives. Charlie began raising money for a charity very close to his heart, Meningitis now. Charlie contracted meningitis as a baby and nearly lost his life to the disease, but it was with the help of Leicester General NeoNatal Unit that he survived. Since the first lockdown in March, Charlie has run **297** miles, with the support of his family by his side every single day - his younger sister Kitty in Year 1, and Mum Alex and Dad Tim Slack. As the months passed over the year Charlie and his family added two more charities alongside Meningitis Now; Young Minds and Alex's Wish.

The school are doing this 300th Mile for Alex's wish in particular. This is a charitable cause set-up to support a local Leicestershire boy Alex (age 14) who lives in Queniborough who suffers from Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy.

Celebrating the end of Charlie's covid-mile journey after nine long months, local communities will join Charlie on Christmas eve to cheer him on, run alongside him, and enjoy the celebrations together to mark this wonderful uplifting achievement from a remarkable young boy.

Charlie's aim was to raise £2 per day raising £560 but he is now at an amazing 431% above target (£2400).
